**TONE** in fiction is the *attitude* of the narrator or viewpoint character toward story events and other characters. In a story with first-person POV, tone can also be the narrator's attitude toward the reader.

**MOOD** is what the *reader* feels while reading a scene or story. It's not the reader's emotions, but the *atmosphere* (the vibe) of a scene or story.

#### Tone

How does the narrator react to sensory details? (Touch, sight, taste, sound, smells)

How does the narrator respond to events and revelations?

What is the narrator's general attitude?

What kinds of things does the narrator choose to focus on?

Tone can change throughout the story, but tends to stay consistent

### Analyzing Tone and Mood - Divergent movie trailer

Student group 1 - Tone

Watch for: characters' dialogue. What words seem significant? What TONE is this setting?

Student group 2 - Tone

Watch for: characters' movement. Fast? Slow? How is movement setting a TONE?

Student group 3 - Mood

Watch for: The music and sounds. How is music and sound setting a MOOD?

Student group 4 - Mood

Watch for: The setting. What colors are being used? Warm or cool? What MOOD is this setting?

Student group 5: Mood

Watch for: Characters' emotions via facial expressions, how they change, etc. How are these expressions setting a MOOD?
